The Recycling Raccoon Squad is here to help Michigan reclaim its title as the greatest recycling state in the country. These rules for curbside recyclers will help you up your game, but take note - the rules in every town are a little bit different. Check with your local recycler to be sure you know it before you throw it.

The general rule is that 1s and 2s are accepted everywhere. Check with your local recycler on 3s–7s. |
| CARLOS CARDBOARD | Nonrefrigerated paperboard or boxboard (e.g., tissue boxes, cereal boxes, etc.)   | Paperboard for refrigerated and frozen items (e.g., frozen dinner boxes, pop cases, etc.) Paper cartons (e.g., juice, milk, etc.)   | Tape, staples and labels are OK  Flatten cardboard  Cannot have any food residue or grease stains  Tape, staples and labels are OK        | SQUAD TIP:  If it doesn't go in the refrigerator or freezer, it is recyclable curbside even if it seems shiny.  |
